## People gain and maintain employment

**1,407** unemployed or underemployed individuals participated in employment programs; over **37%** secured jobs

**247** adult basic education learners, individuals without a GED and adults with learning disabilities made progress towards their education goals

**366** individuals received behavioral counseling to help them secure employment and succeed as employees

395 job seekers

# Children start school ready to learn

**812** children attended learning programs that monitor developmental milestones and provide needed intervention

**92**% of children demonstrated improved social, emotional, language, cognitive, and physical skills

95% of parents and caregivers increased their understanding of age-appropriate childhood development and activities to better support learning

# People practice disease prevention and management, and safety preparedness

**\$4.2M** of free or discounted prescription medications provided to more than **1,200** chronic disease patients

**717** adults improved preventive health behavior and clinical outcomes

109 adults received behavioral health and substance abuse treatment

**35** at-risk households received hazard education, planning and safety device installation

# People gain knowledge, skills and support to manage expenses

**2,277** individuals attended **129** financial literacy classes

1,917 individuals experiencing financial stress received one-on-one counseling on budgeting, money management and credit issues; 72% increased their budgeting skills

**2,636** low and moderate income individuals and families were connected to **\$7.9M** in federal and state income enhancing benefits

**236** households received utility and rent assistance

205 homeowners at risk of foreclosure were able to remain in their homes through mortgage assistance, financial counseling and legal aid



# People affected by family violence and sexual assault experience relief and rehabilitation

15,914 nights of safe shelter and accommodations were provided to **644** children and adult victims of abuse

75 victims were provided forensic medical care and other support services

**489** victims developed a personalized safety

**187** forensic interviews were conducted to aid in criminal prosecution on behalf of child victims

# Nonprofits have the skills, infrastructure and resources to achieve their mission

More than **3,000** connections made to nonprofits and other community resources

**1,524** volunteers contributed nearly **5,000** hours to nonprofit service projects

17 nonprofits were provided with 363 gas cards, 2,989 bus vouchers and 127 taxi rides to meet the transportation needs of 1,067 low-income women

### RAISE FUNDS

STEP TWO

# VISIT AGENCIES

Approximately 75 trained Unite Way Investment Volunteers spend nearly 400 hours and travel more than 1,400 miles visiting local health and huma service agencies to see first-hand the impact of United Way for January 1



STEP THRE

# EVALUATE REQUESTS

United Way Investment Volunteers spend more than **3,000** hours reviewing fundin requests from those agencies including: budgets, financial statements and program outcomes and meet to discus funding recommendations

# PRESENT RECOMMENDATIONS

STEP FIVE

# CONTRACT SERVICES

Agencies are notified of funding and sign an agreement holding them accountable to standards of financial stewardship and delivery of program outcomes

United Way reviews agency progress reports and provides on-going training and technical assistance to help agencies build organization and program capacity to deliver results for the community
